### Scholarships & FAFSA meetings

Scholarships—like grants—are financial aid that you don't need to pay back. Scholarships are offered by many different groups, organizations, and even individuals. They're offered for all kinds of achievements and to all kinds of students. They're usually competitive, with eligible applicants competing for a limited number of awards. But remember, you're competing only against others who actually apply.

You can find the complete listing of VSAC-supported scholarships in VSAC's free scholarships booklet. Check your school counseling office or visit https://publications.vsac.org to order a copy in the mail. Keep in mind: The very hard deadline for scholarship material submission is February 15, 2023.

Think about who your student will ask for letters of recommendation and make that ask ASAP. It's really helpful to get on each person's radar before too many people ask! And when we talk about the "hard deadline," we mean that everything needed for the review committee to look at **must** be in the student's file at VSAC on February 15, 2023.

#### **FAFSA Fridays continue at VSAC**

Families of students entering college in the fall must complete the FAFSA prior to enrolling. This is the gateway to federal funding, scholarships, and grants. VSAC's skilled financial aid counselors can help!

First, make sure to go to https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch to create an account with Federal Student Aid and to get your FSA ID. Then you can get help in a number of ways:

- Ask your counseling office if your school has scheduled a Forms Night, where a VSAC counselor will assist you in filing both the FAFSA and the Vermont grant application.
- · Schedule a 1:1 meeting with VSAC to receive personalized guidance on the FAFSA. For in-person or virtual appointments, visit www.vsac.org/events or call 1-877-961-4369.
- · Drop in at our Winooski office at 10 East Allen Street through the end of January (Tuesdays-Thursdays between 9:00 am-3:00 pm). Stop by to work independently on your FAFSA and ask questions to VSAC staff as they arise
- Have a quick FAFSA question? Call 833-802-8722 with your questions Monday–Friday between 8:00 am-4:30 pm.

Please call ahead for the detailed list of items you'll need for your 2023-2024 FAFSA.

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## **GEAR UP GUIDE** student spotlight

Abdimajiid Mohamed is a GEAR UP alumni from Winooski, Vermont. Born in Somalia, Abdi and his family immigrated to Winooski when he was just 8 years old. He graduated from Winooski High School in 2018.

"Coming from an immigrant family, it's difficult navigating higher education because I am a first-generation college student," says Abdi. "For me, it was a sink-or-swim type deal mainly because I had to figure it out myself."

Abdi is currently attending Trine University in Indiana, where he's finishing up his dual bachelor of science and master's in business administration degrees with honors. Despite the barriers he's faced, he has certainly left his mark on campus, having founded the first ever Black Student Union, served as Student Body vice president, and played soccer for two years. His accomplishments were met with many twists and turns, however—Abdi transferred to a few schools before settling on Trine.

"Many first-year college students find the process of transferring institutions to be overwhelming," says Abdi. "A big lesson I learned when transferring was identifying a contact person for admissions, student services, and financial aid. More often than not, those 3 departments are the main ones working on your transfer process, so reaching out and building a connection to a point person makes the process much easier."

Abdi emphasizes that the mentorship he received during his time in high school from both his community and GEAR UP

Outreach helped him tremendously in finding his footing and preparing him for the difficulties of navigating higher education. So much so that he's still making waves in his community from afar. He's currently interning with GEAR UP GUIDE to strengthen mentorship partnerships with already established mentor programs in Vermont communities. He was also recently appointed by Winooski's City Council to serve as a member of the Winooski Commission for Inclusion and Belonging.

"Working with GUIDE, I'm able to be a leader in my community," says Abdi. "GUIDE has exposed me to opportunities that not only develop me as a student, but also as a profes-

sional. The initiatives we take on enable me to apply my experience with GUIDE back to the classroom, which allows me to grow my classroom experience as part of a working team."

GEAR UP GUIDE is fortunate to have Abdi on the team, and we look forward to continuing our work with him this fall. We can't wait to see where his path takes him!

#### **GEAR UP** Week & the start of school activities

National GEAR UP Week kicked off with a leap of faith in September with a trip to the Hulbert Outdoor Center in Fairlee, Vermont. Twenty-one middle schoolers took up the challenge to complete a day-long ropes course. Students were led by a team of expert counselors trained in challenge-by-choice outdoor exploration. Split into small groups, students were lead through a series of low-ropes course activities designed to inspire team building, trust, and leadership skills. The students amazed us yet again!


Students tested their newfound confidence by completing high-ropes course challenges, some as far up as 30 feet in the air. From balance beams to the zipline, students had the opportunity to learn in a new sensory environment and develop skills not typical of a classroom experience. GEAR UP also took the full 8th grade class from Richford Jr/Sr High School to Northwoods Stewardship Center for a fun day of team building challenges and learning about glacial erratics the following day.

Meanwhile, in Proctor, middle schoolers were surprised by a morning interruption of donuts, cider, and career games. Most popular was the spin-the-wheel career question game and the "I want to be..." photo booth. Other activities included rock painting and a trip to the State House in Montpelier for Equity Day.



On November 3rd, Danville Middle School students spent the day at Burke Mountain shooting rescue lines, making pizza with the chef, touring suites, learning about snow-making, and tuning skis with state-of-the-art equipment. The day was designed so that students could learn first-hand about the variety of skills and careers involved in running a world-class resort. Faculty and staff from Vermont State University–Lyndon joined the students for lunch, sharing the academic majors that are designed for working in a resort environment. What an amazing group of students from Danville, and the staff from Burke Mountain welcomed them right into their world.

Finally, GEAR UP's after-high school programming, GUIDE, hosted the newest installment of GUIDE LIVE! with Communications Specialist Adriana Eldred and GUIDE's career success expert and intern, Abdi Mohammed. Abdi talked about his experiences growing up in an immigrant household, transferring colleges to a new state to pursue his passion, and the reward of taking the risk.
