

Overview: Early College

Ear·ly /ˈərlē/ adjective

Happening or done before the usual or expected time.

Who: Eligible 12th grade Vermont students

When: Application and approval process during 11th grade year

What: Full year of college in place of their HS senior year

Where: Partnering postsecondary institutions

How: Connect with your HS counselor, apply in Junior year

PERSONALIZED LEARNING PLANNING PROCESS

Creating Personalized Learning Plans (PLP) provides students the opportunity to reflect upon their learning and shape their future, and enables the adults in their lives to better understand each student as a unique individual. However, the actual documentation of the PLP - in any selected format - is only as good as the process that supports its development. The resources provided below support a process much more so than a product. While a clear and thoughtful product is key to ultimate success, students, schools, SUs/SDs must have the



freedom to innovate and adapt formats and platforms to meet the changing needs of learners over time.

Did you know Career and Technical Education centers provide opportunities for students to earn industry recognized credentials, college credits and paid work-based learning experiences?



Career Technical Education (CTE)



 Vermont's CTE centers offer a wide range of opportunities, from manufacturing to health care, from auto technology to design, from cosmetology to HVAC. If the program you want to attend is not offered at your region CTE center, Vermont law provides you with the opportunity to attend that program at another technical center if you meet that center's admissions criteria.

Pre-Tech Exploratory Programs

• Pre-tech exploratory programs are intended as an introduction to all of the programs at a regional career center and are for students in the 9th and 10th grades. These programs include applied instruction in core academic subjects and are designed to assist students in career exploration, including exploration of career areas nontraditional to their gender, and decision making. Programs must run an average of 120 minutes per day.

Pre-Tech Foundational Programs

• These programs familiarize 9th and 10th-grade students with occupations in a career cluster area and instruct students in foundational core academic and occupational skills. Programs must run a minimum of 40 minutes per day. Pre-tech foundational programs are incorporated into a three to four-year sequence of career technical education

Technical Education Programs

• Technical education programs may be offered as half-day (600 minutes per week) or full-day (1200



Did you know that any Vermont resident, age 16 to adult unenrolled from school or at risk of disengaging from school, can obtain a high school diploma through the High School Completion Program?



High School Completion Program

- Designed to offer a flexible pathway to those at least 16 years of age, unenrolled from school or at risk of disengaging from school, the High School Completion Program (HSCP) provides learners with educational services of the scope and rigor needed for the attainment of a high school diploma.
- HSCP students work with their local AEL provider to have their skills assessed in reading, writing, and math and to develop a Personalized Learning Plan (PLP) with the assigned high school that aligns with local graduation requirements. Upon successful completion of the learning activities outlined in their PLP, the student is issued a diploma by the assigned high school.



Did you know, with statewide support of the Vermont Virtual Learning Collaborative, students can design customized courses connected to their personalized learning plan, all validated by a VT Licensed educator?

- Virtual school "To-Go" providing the curricular backbone to any course format whether modular, or experience/place based, or a blended course approach
- Certification and professional development for educators

Did you know there are a range of work-based learning opportunities available around the state that are designed to apply classroom learning to real world settings?



Work-based Learning (WBL)

- WBL is an educational program or experience involving student interactions with industry or community professionals in real, virtual, online, or simulated work environments that exposes learners to postsecondary options, provides opportunities for skill development and proficiency attainment, and allows students to reinforce and deepen their school-based learning.
- In Vermont, we use the following categories to identify the type of WBL opportunities students may pursue:
 - Career Awareness
 - Career Exploration
 - Career Preparation
 - Career Training

 Opportunities for Vermont students to achieve postsecondary readiness that acknowledge individual goals, learning styles, and abilities



- Opportunities for secondary students to pursue flexible pathways to graduation that:
 - increase aspiration and encourage postsecondary continuation
 - are an integral component of a student's personalized learning plan

Provide

 Students, beginning no later than in the seventh grade, with career development and postsecondary planning resources to ensure that they are able to take full advantage of the opportunities available within the flexible pathways to graduation



Act 77: Flexible Pathways Initiative

 - Work-Based Learning opportunities
