What does Projected Openings mean?





"Projected Openings" means how many jobs we think are going to be available in the future --- "How many job are going to available for you to apply for?"

A little background - there are over 600 different types of jobs in Vermont!!! This brochure only focuses on about 60... So keep asking questions and learning more about the different types of jobs. The jobs in this brochure are projected to pay a median wage of over \$30/hour and have at least 300 openings in the state over the next decade. There are many great jobs in VT that aren't on this list because they don't quite meet the hourly wage or projected openings target.





I want to be an actor. Is that a job I could have in VT?





Yes, it is possible but opportunities for full-time, in-person, VT based work are limited. There are a lot of famous actors that live in Vermont and then travel to be on location for filming. About 25% of all actors are "self-employed."

There is a vibrant live theater scene in Vermont. Some actors use their other talents to lead production and theater management too.








Sometimes a degree can limit what job you can get - "I got a degree in teaching and I want to be a nurse"; in this case, nursing requires specialized training so you can't switch. But many times a degree is a gateway to more opportunities... I know many people who studied English; they are now lawyers, business owners, human resources manager, so many different pathways.



There are some jobs that require some educational pathways to prepare for a state license (like hygienists, electricians and hair stylists). But generally, a degree will not limit what you are able to eventually do because most degrees help you to continue to develop the 4 Cs. I have a geology degree and now I focus on education.

In addition to the Champlain College opportunities Anthony mentions above, there are other VT colleges and community college programs and boot-camps to help prepare for those jobs. Also, people can self-teach themselves the skills needed for that work. A bonus is that coding and gaming skills can work in many other jobs.




David Saladino
